

The Buick/Cadillac Lawn Show was held Saturday, June 1st at the Saratoga Auto Museum. It was an absolutely beautiful, day resulting in a total of 44 cars registered. As in past years, it was dominated by the Cadillacs; 31 Cadillacs and 13 Buicks. Besides some beautiful cars on display, there was a 50/50 raffle and a small 'chance' auction. There was also a food vendor to feed the hungry. Top 5 plus Best of Show awards were handed out for both Buick and Cadillac. At the end of the day, four of the Top 5 Buick awards went to club members; Ken Malette for his '69 wagon, Tom & Dianne Proulx for their '66 Electra, Vince & Pete Riggi for their '53 Special, and yours truly for his '67 GS400. The other Top 5 Buick award went to a '63 Special convertible owned by Steve Kurtz. Buick Best of Show went to Terry Plante for his '66 Wildcat GS. Buick Club members Frank & Jean Starkes, also members of the Caddy Club, took home the Cadillac Best of Show for their '59 Coupe DeVille. Top 5 Cadillac awards went to Joe Roglieri for his 1960 Eldorado Seville, Don Rancotti for his 1949 2Dr Coupe, Peter Clark, showing a 1976 Eldorado Convertible, Bob Kowalczyk, with a 1952 60 Fleetwood and Joe Murdico, who brought his 1956 Coupe De Ville. All award winners were also given \$20 Stewart' gas cards. The 50/50 winner took home \$145.

One car I found interesting was a 1966 Cadillac Sedan (can't remember what model) that sported not only power vent windows, but power quarter windows in the rear!. The driver has 8 power window switches to play with. This same car had real wood trim on the doors as well, something I thought was gone in American cars by then.

1936 BUICK CENTURY Story by Frank Starkes

Twenty Eight years before what is known as the "Birth of the Muscle Car Era" with the iconic "1964 Pontiac GTO," Buick hit the road running with the brand new Buick Century. It soon garnered the Nickname of "The Bankers Hot Rod." Buick put the 320 cubic inch Roadmaster engine in the base model Buick Special, and the name Buick Century was born.

Midway between 1929 and 1939 America was in bad financial shape, known as the Great Depression. Millions of people across the Country were struggling to just exist; so this was a very brave and bold move from Buick. I have owned four Buick Roadmaster convertibles over the years with this gigantic straight eight engine, and I can personally attest to its powerful smooth and quiet operation. I can only imagine the top end speed and power, compared with all the other cars of the period. It sure had to turn heads, based on its long hood, and sporty coupe lines.

My first car back in 1951 was a 1937 Chevy Sport Coupe, much like the above Buick. The color appears to be Beryl Green, as it was the same as my Chevy. Notice the Rumble Seat, the long hood to cover the big engine, the spare tires encased in the front fenders with mirrors on top, the parking lights atop the front fenders, and the Artillery wheels which were in vogue in 1936. The lines of the car, and the overall appearance are perfect; and speaks "Buick" from bumper to bumper.

NOTE: The content of the story may not be perfect, but as best
